On Wednesday, the English Department invited Years 5 to 8 to watch and act in Shakespeare 's renowned play, *The Tempest*. With an excellent imagination & extraordinary acting from The Young Shakespeare Company, we were able to immerse ourselves in a wonderful story with plot twists and interesting characters, such as Prospero who, from the Duke of Milan, turned into a mysterious, magic wizard, controlling a desert island and its spirits. What impressed me about Prospero was how he forgave his enemies and his brother Antonio in particular for trying to kill him and take over the Dukedom of Milan. The boys were given the chance to recreate scenes, the best of which was the Tempest scene, when we all shouted "We split! We split!". The acting helps us to understand Claliban's mistreatment & how Prospero's lust for revenge was buried away. This brought a happy ending to a stormy play. *Xerxes*







A big week for the Eco-Council





This week has seen a lot of action on the "Eco Front". On Monday a team of "Warriors" led by Leo started the ball rolling by giving an assembly on the importance of reducing the amount of meat in our diet. The boy's presentation gave the environmental reasons for giving up meat as well as those concerning animal welfare and healthy eating. The assembly was in preparation for our first "Meat Free" day on Wednesday, during which over 70% of boys in the Prep School and almost all the staff, swapped their meat for a vegetarian lunch to help save the planet!

Also this week the Eco-Council held their termly Whole School Meeting where representatives from all parts of the School were represented, from pupils to Governors and parents. We discussed a wide range of ideas and initiatives. The Pre-Prep had ideas on how to reduce the impact of car emissions in the playground by switching off engines and making our water bottles more durable. The Prep School boys reported on the work of the weekly Eco-Council which has included organising Meat Free Wednesday, RSPB's garden birdwatch, switch-off fortnight and regular collections for recycling. New ideas involved recycling used books with a "book swap" to holding an "Earth Hour". We are very hopeful that with all this good work we will raise our School from a Silver Award Eco-School to a fully-fledged Green Flag School! A NEW WOLAS PUBLIC OBSERVING EVENT FOR 2020

VIEW THE NIGHT SKY FROM RUISLIP LIDO

The West of London Astronomical Society invites you to observe the Moon and stars from Ruislip Lido.

Friday 28th February - Sunday 1st March 2020
Time 7.00pm to 9.00pm.

If the sky is clear, a crescent moon will be visible, we may also be able to see objects including Venus, the Orion Nebula, the Seven Sisters star cluster, the Andromeda Galaxy and maybe the Crab Nebula.

Bring your family and friends. Members of WOLAS will be on hand using a variety of telescopes and will be able to answer any questions you may have.

Don't forget to wear warm clothing and bring a torch. To prevent dazzling observers, please limit the brightness of your torch to your phone's light or equivalent and point it down when on site.

On nights when observing is possible, the Turntable tea room will be open for refreshments, courtesy of the Lido Railway. Toilets are available.

Please visit our website for more information. A GO/NO GO call will be posted no later than 4pm each day.

Ruislip Lido is off Bury Street. Entry is via the gate adjacent to the car park at the end of Reservoir Road HA47TY

KEEP RIGHT ON ENTERING THE PUBLIC CAR PARK WHICH IS FREE FROM 6PM.


