They had to work hard all day, and be at their best, as a strict imaginary Headteacher, Mr Wigham, would not tolerate any mischief. No left handedness, no wasting of lined paper, no dirty hands, no ink spillage, or the cane would come out. German spies, air raids and black outs transformed the Norman Hall, but the boys had their gas masks ready! We were impressed with the boys' efforts to remain in character for the whole day. In the afternoon several Year 5 mums joined us in their amazing outfits so we could recreate the village market with all its shops. In the café named Dolly's, at the butcher's, the baker's and all the other grocery shops boys had to produce ration cards, identity cards, shillings and farthings. What a great way to imagine what life must have been like for young children during the Second World War.










Quiz Club Maths Challenge Friday 10th May

**Outstanding performances:** The whole team and Zac who scored 32 runs in the four matches. Also Sahib B who took 3 wickets and Rohan who took 3 wickets.

Each match consisted of 8 players and everyone batted for two overs only. Each player on the field bowled an over as well with one player getting an extra over. Our first match was against St Anthony's where we batted and scored 239 with some sensible batting from Zac and Nayan. By only losing two wickets this enabled us to score 239. St Anthony's went into bat and our bowling proved too strong with Sahib B, Aryan, Hamza and Rohan all taking wickets. With good fielding as well we won the game.

Our next match was against the Falcon with St John's batting first. Ruben and Hamza batted well and we managed to score valuable runs and our overall total was 239. Again good bowling from Rohan who took two wickets in an over and Aryan enabled us to keep the Falcon from scoring many runs. In the end after 8 overs the Falcon had reached 205.

Our final match in the group was against MTP who proved to be the strongest team we played at the Festival. St John's batted but against some very good bowling we were only able to score 205. We battled hard but MTP team scored 150 runs and they went on to win the final against The Beacon.

We were allowed a break in the festival to see the Sri Lankan team who were training at Merchant Taylors' School in preparation for the upcoming World Cup. It was a fantastic experience for all the boys to meet the team and get their bats signed by all the players.

Our final game was against Chesham Prep and we scored 223 against a good bowling attack as well as some brilliant catches taken from the opposition. Ruben, Zac, Sahib B, Rohan, Nayan all batted well. Our bowling and fielding needed to be good and we managed to take some wickets early on in the first over. Oliver took an excellent catch and we started to dominate the match. We just kept getting wickets at the right time and in the end Chesham Prep could only score 215. So overall we played 4 and won 3 matches. A great effort by the U10's A cricket team. Overall we came 4th out of 12 teams.

St John's won the toss and opted to bat first on this occasion and opened with Nishil and Aaryan. It ended up being a bit of a tough afternoon with our batting with a number of wickets falling, mainly being cleanly bowled. Learning from this we need to focus more on batting technique but especially shot selection. Arian showed good composure with the bat. Putting up our defence in the field, St John's started strong and were complemented on our bowling. At the 10 over mark we were still level



with Haberdashers' but unfortunately this was followed by three pretty expensive overs allowing them to close the match pretty quickly and easily in the end. Valuable learning and coaching points. Looking forward to the next training session to focus on these. Well done team.

St John's opened the batting and started slowly. Unfortunately several wickets fell quickly. Yusuf made several quick runs and was our best batsman on the day. Everyone got to bowl two overs, which gave valuable game experience. Wickets were taken by several but Ethan had an excellent day, taking 3-1 off his two overs, and the man of the match award with it. In the end we were simply beaten by a better team. Well done to all of the boys on their efforts.

#### Colts C v Haberdashers' Lost (Pairs match)

Colts C played their first match of the season against Haberdashers on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> May. We played a pairs match where each pair faced 4 overs batting and every boy bowled. Aydin, Alex, Hilkesh, Xerxes and Raffi all scored a few boundaries. However, we needed to show more urgency running between the wickets. We ended with a respectable total of 187 runs. When it came to bowling, Xerxes and Alex both took two wickets each and Sam and Jaidev also took a wicket each. Unfortunately we were a little wayward with our bowling and did not take enough wickets to keep Haberdashers score down. Haberdashers scored 202 and therefore won by 115 runs.



It was a good first effort from the Colts C team but there is a lot more to learn about running between the wickets, bowling accurately and staying awake in the field.

We batted first and scored 52 runs off of mostly singles and wides and batted very defensively. We batted in pairs and as a result had very good communication whether to run or not and managed to sneak a few runs off over throws. When we came to bowl we only got 3 wickets compared to their 5, therefore only taking 15 runs off of their overall total (5 runs a wicket) which aided us a little in limiting their runs. Wickets came from Neal who caught a high ball (David bowled), Jesse and Cyrus who both bowled their batsmen out cleanly. Haberdashers' final total was 136 off of 18 overs compared to our 52; however our bowling was far better than theirs as we had half the amount of wides and consistently kept the ball straight and pitched it at good length. We did miss a few catching opportunities which would have aided us but this can be improved upon in the future.

Aryan bowled and fielded well in the tough Belmont match and Ashok's last over which included two wickets nearly forced a victory. Reece was the St John's man of the tournament with a solid all round display which included 16 not out against Merchant Taylors' Prep and some positive bowling and fielding. We look forward to the upcoming matches knowing we can build steady competitive scores.
