Wreath laid in Northwood



On Tuesday morning, our Head and Deputy Head boys joined Mr Robinson, Mrs Savage and Mrs Walker at the Northwood Cenotaph to pay their respects ahead of Remembrance Day. In the past, St John's boys have joined the Northwood community at the annual Remembrance service and laid a wreath of poppies, on behalf of everyone at the School.

This year, the service wasn't going

ahead in its usual way but we still felt it was very important for Alexander, Rodrigo and Vishwadrik to have an opportunity to fulfil this role and understand more about why we pay our respects in this way. The boys were able to see the wreaths laid by others in the community, including the other local schools, businesses and religious groups of all faiths, and we were proud to lay ours down alongside them.

Assemblies restart in the Norman Hall

For the first time since March, the Prep School came to the Norman Hall for Assemblies this week. We socially distanced in Year Group bubbles, Year 8 on Monday, Year 7 on Wednesday and Year 6 today. In the Assemblies, the Headmaster reflected on the true price of war and the ultimate sacrifice of so many young men, no older than some of the Year 8 boys' brothers. He told the boys that it was very important that we never forget and continue to be grateful.

The poppy is our symbol of gratitude and Mr Robinson reminded the boys of the commemorative art installation "Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red" at the Tower of London

in 2014, marking the anniversary of the First World War. There were 888,246 ceramic poppies, each one representing a British military fatality during the war. He showed the boys the ceramic poppy which St John's School bought for Remembrance. He also reminded the boys of the vital role played by our armed forces in the current pandemic, from testing to building hospitals.

They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old; Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, We will remember them.








Year 5 poppy making

School Eco Council first meeting report

Before we broke up for half term, we managed to hold our first Eco Council meeting of the school year. Of course, because there were representatives from different parts of the School, we had to use Zoom to keep everyone safe from Covid-19. Years 5, 7 and 8 and Pre-Prep boys joined from laptops set up in corridors around the School, while Year 6 joined from home. Some boys were so keen that there were multiple delegates from one class. The minutes were taken by Vishwadrik in Year 8.

Each delegate had a chance to speak about their ideas and share them with the Council. The boys had a wide range of topics to discuss. There were lots of suggestions from the Year 5 boys about looking after the habitat around the School and feeding the birds over the winter months. Harry said that we should increase the trees around the School to provide space for wildlife and, as Aarav said, to replace those being burnt down. We also talked about ways in which we can reduce the carbon footprint at school; by switching things off and by walking to school or, as Leo suggested, we could encourage electric cars by installing a charging point in our car park.

George L spoke about his class's sponsorship of Rhinos and suggested that other classes might want to sponsor different animals. George G suggested that money could be raised for tree planting. Anay suggested that money could be raised for the David Attenborough Trust fund.

Mithil raised the problem of disposable masks and gloves at school and asked that people look at reusable types instead. Krish had the idea of holding an Eco Week, where each class could focus on one aspect of sustainability. Ishaan suggested a Nature Club where boys could focus on caring for animals in the School grounds and Joshua suggested we use Ecosia as a search engine and plant vegetables in the school grounds. In Year 8 Cyrus and Jesse had the idea of installing energy efficient LED lights and running a cycle to school programme.

The boys from the Pre-Prep also had a lot of good ideas. Aarav said we should reduce the amount of cling-film used to wrap our food and Aaron said we should use only reusable bags.

Over the next few weeks we will be looking in detail at these ideas and if you have any of your own please let your class Eco delegate know. We will have another meeting later this term.



Leo's passion for skiing and climbing

Mr Pawson has asked me to say a few words about skiing and climbing. Like many boys I play rugby and cricket at school because I must. I take PE and swimming lessons to keep fit but don't really enjoy them. My passions are for skiing and climbing.

For me skiing is a key family activity. I ski with my older brother Sacha (25), sister Phoebe (19) and my father on equal terms. Our annual skiing trip to Italy in February is a key moment in our year. Our preferred ski resort is Foppolo, up in the mountains from the old city of Bergamo north-east of Milan. We travel by EasyJet to Bergamo and then on to Foppolo by car or bus. The local people in Foppolo are very friendly. The hotels are simple but comfortable and the food is excellent. The skiing equipment is excellent and easy to hire.

The skiing in Foppolo is wonderful. There is a 3 km blue run, easy but enjoyable, right into the village centre. Beyond that are two long, more difficult runs from the top of Montebello back to the blue run. One of these red runs leads into the extensive Corona ski area full of more red and black runs. The most challenging part of every day is getting back out of the Corona area as that entails skiing 1km down a black run to get back to the red and blue runs which lead to Foppolo.

1 km on a black run might not sound long but it's really steep and can be very tiring if it's icy. The skiing however is fantastic and the scenery breathtaking. Often the sky is bright blue. Sometimes the sunshine is yellow and pink through the mist. We stop regularly to eat and drink. I like diet Coke, my father likes hot wine.

At the end of each day we are utterly exhausted. We shower,

eat dinner, then talk briefly with friends and family before sleeping. I never sleep better.

We have skied in other places too. In January we went to Oslo for a weekend. We have also skied in Engelburg, Saas Fee and Chamonix, but Foppolo has a special beauty and familiarity for us.

Back at home I ski, from time to time, at the Snow Centre at Hemel Hempstead. The centre has a real snow run of about 150 m. It's good for keeping skills and balance fresh but it's nothing as enjoyable as skiing in the mountains.

At home I much prefer to improve my climbing skills. I try to climb at least once every week at HarroWall. This is the largest indoor climbing centre in the UK and one of the largest in Europe. The tuition is excellent, the staff are always really helpful and supportive.

After this lockdown finishes I'll start logging climbs and skills again to complete my NIBAS (National Indoor Bouldering Award Scheme) level three. There are five levels from beginner to expert.

Skiing and climbing can be dangerous. Earlier in the summer I was "blue lighted" to Northwick Park A&E as a precaution after I fell awkwardly onto the mats at HarroWall. However, with good training and support the risks are low. The adrenaline rushes when you succeed, or even fail, in using skill and strength do something difficult are fantastic.

If you want to start free climbing at HarroWall you, and a parent or other adult, will need to pass a basic one hour safety course. I recommend you try it.
