

School Council meets the Mayor of Hillingdon





On Wednesday all the current School Council members met bright and early at 7.45am to accompany Mr Phillips, Mrs Murphy, Mr Newman and Miss Morgan to Uxbridge Civic Centre to meet the Mayor of Hillingdon, Councillor David Yarrow. When we arrived, we were greeted warmly and escorted to the Mayor's chambers where he gave us an informative lesson on his duties as the Mayor. We learned that Hillingdon used to be three separate boroughs; Ruislip-Northwood, West Drayton and Uxbridge and that in a council meeting, he would represent the voice and opinion of Her Majesty, the Queen. There were numerous items placed around the chambers, for example a silver mace which represented the Queen's presence in a meeting and of particular interest was the Mayor's necklace, otherwise known as the chain of office. What was interesting was that long ago, a new linkage would be attached when each new mayor was elected; however, it became too heavy, so instead now their names are added in a gold booklet at the bottom. We were also allowed to sit down in the council chambers where the official meetings take place; we learned that this is similar to the House of Commons, although a lot simpler...and smaller! The Pre-Prep boys found this particularly fun as they had the chance to try out the microphones! The Mayor was very kind to treat us to refreshments and school council members asked very mature and intriguing questions. We were very grateful that the Mayor spoke of us highly, as we were the first school of many to visit and, in his words, "had set the bar high with our good behaviour." We returned to St John's before lunchtime, having enjoyed the excursion very much and all of the School Council members are very grateful to the teachers for taking us on this trip, which is the first time for a St John's School Council. 


1st & 2nd XI v The Beacon 19th June

St John's 99 for 9, The Beacon 101 for 5

We batted first and set a score of 99 for 9 through an equal split of runs between our 9 batsmen. Our shot selection was good at times with some nice drives however we were gifted with many easy balls to hit which we didn't use fully to our advantage. Our running between the wickets wasn't up to our own standards due to the weather conditions to which we lost a few wickets as a result but still scored a respectable amount of runs in the 20 overs. The Beacon reached our target of 99 runs in 14 overs with help from their number 3 batsman who reached 59 runs. Wickets came from Ashok (2), Aryan, Aaron and Aadil. Aadil and Ashok both bowled superbly with Ashok getting his wickets in the opening over and Aadil bowling 2 overs for 8 runs and a wicket. On an increasingly rain-sodden afternoon the Second XI won a thrilling victory against traditionally strong opponents. The game swung backwards and forwards almost as often as the drizzle slackened and intensified keeping the spectators on their toes in a really tense final few overs. Batting first our openers, Rohan and Krish, got the innings off to a brisk start with a partnership of 36 in six overs before Rohan was out caught behind. Krish, who had consistently hit the ball into the gaps, soon followed, run out for 27. Thereafter, our innings lost momentum against some tight bowling and predictably well drilled fielding with only Zac who got a lively 14 able to score boundaries. Nevertheless Saam, batting at number three, soldiered on and our innings ended with him hitting a four on the final ball to leave us on a respectable 85-7 and him on 20 not out. Oliver rotated our bowlers intelligently and restricted The Beacon to 28-1 from the first seven overs. However, their captain then began to score freely and they gained the initiative despite wickets falling at the other end. 
U8 A v St Martin's pairs format




Year 5 visit Heath Robinson Museum


