


### U11 A & B teams v UCS Friday 28th June


## Senior Cricket v Davenies 3rd July

On a gloriously sunny afternoon two well matched teams played their last fixture for the season, and for most of the players their last match for their respective schools, in the attractive setting of Beaconsfield C.C. The match was fittingly competitive until almost the end when the St John's innings ran out of steam. Earlier Davenies had won the toss and sensibly chose to bat. They made a good start against some tidy bowling from our opening bowlers Ashok and Aaron. In the tenth over we finally got a wicket from a run out, and for the next few overs spin twins Shivam and Krish turned the screw on the scoring rate but failed to make a crucial breakthrough meaning that Davenies reached 93-1 by the nineteenth over. In the final frenetic overs we suddenly took wickets whilst not altogether preventing an acceleration of the scoring rate. Shane bowled especially well at the death getting 3-17, all clean bowled, whilst Aryan 2-5 and Shivank also chipped in with wickets.
